- We were incorporated as an Australian Not-for-Profit Company Limited by Guarantee ÷ and the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profit Commission approved our application to become an Australian Registered Charity; The Business of the Company was formally Registered as the Greenethorpe Community
- Resources & Information Centre; We purchased Peppertree Cottage on Northcote Street in Greenethorpe, and undertook
- ÷ a range of activities to help preserve the heritage value of the property; We received contributions of furniture and other household goods from the estates of *
- two former residents, as well as interests associated with the Company; We have received several very generous donations of books from a Bathurst City Councillor, the Greenethorpe Soldiers Memorial Hall Committee, and others; ÷

- We have converted one room of the Cottage into a Community Room which includes a small Library Facility with about 2,500 Books and Magazines available for loan. We also have a small selection of pre-loved clothing and household items for sale, and hope to gather a range of information brochures and other materials for locals and visitors;
- As well as face-to-face meetings with many local residents, businesses, and community leaders, we introduced ourselves by issuing a flyer and through social media, including ٠
- the setup of the Greenethorpe Guardians Facebook Page (with almost 100 followers); We have commissioned a local professional Landscape Architect to assist us in developing a Master Plan for a Community Garden and Outdoor Community Area which we hope to open to the local community and visitors in the future; We have assisted a local disadvantaged family in finding suitable accommodation in a ÷

- local farmhouse (near where the Managing Director lived in the 1960s and 1970s); and We made a submission to Weddin Shire Council in respect to Council's Destinations ÷ Management Plan, and are represented on the G2G Rail Trail Working Party

We have several new projects planned for the coming year, and we will always listen to the issues and concerns of locals, and where appropriate we will advocate for improvements. We are hoping to open our Community Centre soon, subject to Covid restrictions and being able to recruit employees and volunteers. We are currently seeking a part-time Community Officer, and a part-time Ground & Building Officer. RAIL TRAIL PROPOSAL FOR SECTION OF FORMER GRENFELL LINE

A group of Greenethorpe residents are calling on surrounding communities to show support for a rail trail on a 30-kilometre section of the former Grenfell branchline between the intermediate village of Greenethorpe and the Grenfell terminus.

The initiative asks those who are in support of a rail trail to hang a "Greene-bike" from their fence. Creator of the Greene-bike initiative and owner of the iconic regional attraction landra Castle, Rod Kershaw, hoped the community would get behind the idea.

"The idea is to get overwhelming community support for it so that the politics involved will be dissolved," he said. "Then everyone would have to come on board because of the support we have for it".

The Grenfell-based Weddin Shire Council's draft Destination Management Plan identifies the region as ideal for cycling tourism.

Closed to passenger services in 1974, and to freight services in 1991, the plan highlights the Greenethorpe to Grenfell corridor as a possible "regional recreational asset".

Mr Kershaw said it made perfect sense to convert the corridor, with other local government areas seeing success with similar projects.

"We went to Tumbarumba and the rail trail there two weekends ago," he said in an interview published in the Cowra Guardian on 5 October. "The rail trail opened in April and all the people at the motel had bikes".

Greenethorpe already had a strong cycling attraction with the Tour De Greenethorpe being held from 2010 to 2017.

Organiser of the Tour De Greenethorpe, Sam Allen, said with 150 riders attending the event, a rail trail may have kept the race alive.

"It would have been fantastic, makes it a lot easier to organise," he said. "A lot of our problems were having to close roads and marshalling; we don't have to do that on a rail trail".

Mr Allen said that while he understood opposition to rail trails in the Hilltops or Cowra council areas, it didn't make sense for this corridor.

'The problem with Young is that the Blayney to Demondrille rail line could realistically open and I'm surprised it hasn't," he said. "Whereas here, there is very little chance it will ever open again. "Realistically it's a corridor owned by the state government that's just sitting there doing nothing and this would be a perfect use for it".

Mr Hodges, who also took part in the trip to the Tumbarumba trail, said it had been fantastic to see the number of tourists visiting the community and it could happen here.

"I think we're finding in the district is, if you build it, they will come," he said. "I have read that every dollar spent on encouraging cyclists to come results in a six dollar spend in the community. "A one to six return is incredible".
